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Study Reveals Promising Impact of El Monte's Guaranteed Income Program

The City of El Monte has proudly announced the successful impact of its Guaranteed pioneering Program (GIP), as revealed in the latest evaluation study. This pilot program, a collaborative effort between the City and RAND Corporation, with support from USC Sol Price School of Public Policy, has shown promising results in enhancing the well-being of 125 participants.

Launched in April 2023, the GIP aimed to provide \$500 in assistance to selected residents, mitigating the economic strain caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and enhancing their overall quality of life. The program attracted over 2,500 applications, with 125 individuals selected to participate in the pilot program. Eligible participants were female heads of household (no spouse present) with children under 18 years, experiencing economic strain due to COVID-19. El Monte residency, and with a verified household income at or below the poverty level based on U.S. Department of Commerce thresholds. The impact evaluation study, led by



the RAND Corporation and USC Sol of participants identified as Latinx or Price School of Public Policy, focused Hispanic. on a range of outcomes, including experiencing depressive symptoms, economic security, housing stability, health, and self-efficacy. Preliminary findings from surveys and focus groups indicate significant improvements in participants'



A Beginner's Introduction **To Cryptocurrency**

Cryptocurrencies like Bitcoin and Ethereum are digital currencies that allow people to make anonymous transactions electronically without involving third parties, such as banks, credit cards or companies like PayPal. This is appealing because third-party institutions often charge fees and slow down the transfer especially process, for large, international transfers. Cryptocurrencies eliminate the need for a middleman by using a peer-topeer network that relies on cryptography — the practice of encrypting information so that only select people can read and process

These currencies are not only virtual but also decentralized, meaning that no government or central authority controls how much is in circulation. Instead, circulation is monitored by the user community, and transaction data is stored on computers across the world.

How blockchain works

Rather than using intermediaries, cryptocurrencies use blockchain technology to record and verify transactions. A blockchain is a list of all transactions that occur using a cryptocurrency, with each block representing a specific transaction. It can be accessed by anyone using the currency but is encrypted so your private information stays secure.

When you start using cryptocurrency, you receive a digital wallet and a public and private key. Your private key is a string of letters and numbers that you use to sign a transfer to confirm that it's from you. Once entered, it becomes encrypted, but other users can use your public key to check that you've signed it with your unique signature.

So, how exactly do transactions

get recorded on the blockchain? When you enter your private key to send cryptocurrency, it spurs an encryption process that generates a complex math problem. Blockchain users compete to solve the problem by running high-powered computers that eventually find the solution to the algorithm. Solving the algorithm results in a new block being added to the chain.

The users competing to solve algorithms are called miners because the user who solves the problem first is rewarded in new digital coins. Each time a block is added, more cryptocurrency is generated. Mining cryptocurrency thus verifies transactions while rewarding the people responsible for keeping the blockchain updated.

Investing in cryptocurrencies

Financial experts are divided on whether cryptocurrency is the future of money or just a passing fad. In any case, at the moment cryptocurrency is a high-risk investment. Since digital currencies have no fixed worth or government backing, their value is purely speculative and can fluctuate wildly, even within a few days. If you buy cryptocurrency, spend only what you're prepared to lose.

Instead buying cryptocurrencies, some experts recommend investing in companies that are developing blockchain technology. Blockchain applications beyond cryptocurrency, and many people think that even if cryptocurrency doesn't blockchain could transform how we do business in the years to come. If you're looking for investment opportunities, consider buying stock in companies that are finding new uses for blockchain.

Glossary Of Investment Terms You Should Know

Are you too embarrassed to ask about the difference between stocks and bonds or what it means to "diversify" your investment portfolio? Here's a brief glossary defining some key investment terms.

Bonds: bonds are formal "IOUs" that specify how a loan will be repaid over time. Government bodies and corporations borrow money from investors to fund projects and pay them interest until the bond reaches maturity and is repaid in full.

Diversification: a diversified investment portfolio means having a mix of different assets to reduce risk. For example, you own stock in a variety of companies and also have bonds; you won't lose everything if one company

Liquidity: liquid investments can be cashed in or sold quickly. This is important if you're investing on a short-term basis.


Mutual funds: with mutual funds, investors pool their money together into one professionally managed investment. An investing expert then determines where the money should go to generate the greatest returns for the investors.

Return on investment (ROI): the profit you make on an investment. It comes in two forms: income generated, including interest and dividends, and increases in values, which means you can sell your shares for a profit.

Stocks: stocks represent partial ownership of a company. When you buy stock, you become a shareholder and earn money when the company does well.

...so the other day, after reading about Mr. Ed being from El Monte, a friend told me that she had grown up in El Monte. She was curious about a couple of things from her childhood.

One was the Lion Farm, to be honest I get questions often about Gay's Lion Farm, usually from people, like my friend, who think they remember hearing the lions but actually aren't old enough to have heard them.

Gay's Lion Farm was established in 1925 by Charles & Muriel Gay. The farm was where the 10 overpass crosses Peck here in El Monte.

If you look close there is a bronze statue of a lion there now, a twin to the one in front of El Monte H.S.

At its height of popularity there were over 200 lions there and it was one of the most popular attractions in So. Calif.

The Lion Farm was closed in 1942 during the war because they couldn't supply the ton of horse meat that the lions need for food each day.

There are many stories about

alleged escapes over the year but the most documented was in 1928 when someone left a cage door unlocked and some of the lions got out.

Tthe trainer Joe Hoffman was mauled but was able to shoot and kill one of the lions while a local police officer shot another one.


Another question I get a lot is about the old duck farm in El Monte. I assume they mean the Woodlands

In truth I think that it was actually in Whittier. That was the big one west of the 605. With over 80,000 ducks it was...quite the smell. To this day I swear I can still smell it when I am driving South on the 605. Woodland Farms closed in 2001.

stability. The cash transfers provided through the program were primarily spent on basic needs such as food, rent, gas, and school supplies.

"The findings from the study are in line with results that we have seen from similar Guaranteed Income Programs across the country and Through internationally. direct financial assistance, we are able to see tangible and positive outcomes that contribute to the improved overall well-being of women and children who were hit the hardest during the pandemic," shared Dr. Emma Aguila, Associate Professor at the Sol Price School of Public Policy and Adjunct Senior Economist at the **RAND** Corporation.

In July 2023, the participants

received their first monthly cash Amercia transfer of \$500, and the final cash transfer is scheduled for May 31, 2024. the program progresses, participants will be offered financial literacy workshops, and a follow-up survey will be conducted to further the long-term assess impact.

The City of El Monte remains committed to supporting its residents through innovative initiatives like the Guaranteed Income Pilot Program. The program's early success underscores the potential of guaranteed income as a tool for social and economic empowerment in the community. By addressing the immediate financial needs of vulnerable households, the GIP has demonstrated its ability to positively impact the lives of participants, providing a foundation for future policies aimed at reducing inequality and improving overall wellbeing.


Routes to School, as well as several MVSD administrators and staff members.

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
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
